Session One - Saturday, August 10

Uncovering the Roots of Feminism: AF3IRM History, Paradigm, and Activism

Facilitator(s): Katrina Socco

- **Description:** This session will begin with community building leading into the theoretical framework surrounding transnational feminism relative to the AF3IRM paradigm.
- **Objective:** To begin building community and safe space among classmates. Establish concretely the connection between historical roots of women's oppression and current women's issues

Session Two - Saturday, August 17

Women's Oppression: An Examination of Patriarchy and Imperialism | Purple Rose Campaign and Trafficking-Labor and Sex Migration

Facilitator(s): Ninfa Patino and Amanda Cruz

- **Description:** This session will provide a brief review of previous session. Building upon that, it will cover the history of the Purple Rose campaign and a global overview of statistics of sex and labor trafficking.
- **Objective:** Provide a historical analysis of AF3IRM's Purple Rose Campaign as it relates to current trafficking issues. Build student knowledge of theory from first session with concrete examples and experiences of sex/labor trafficking from local to global levels. Use this knowledge combined with current events to provoke a thoughtful and engaging discussion with SSoWA members.

- What role does class, race, and gender play in the oppression of women?
- Do patriarchy and imperialism still exist? How does it manifest itself in today's society?
